	bowser is somewhat limited and furthermore, it was considered more beneficial for
	the grounds staff's time to be utilised on 'In Bloom' and other town centred

Minutes of a meeting of the Town Council held on Monday 13th March 2023 at 7.00pm at the Town Hall

Attendees were reminded that the <u>Proceedings</u> of the meeting could be filmed photographed or recorded.

The newly appointed Head of Stroud District Tourism Partnership addressed the meeting on her vision for the immediate future of the partnership, giving a brief overview of her 12 point plan to spread the benefits of sustainable tourism across the district. The Chair apologised for rushing the speaker but invited her to a later meeting to discuss the details of her plan. The Chair thanked the speaker for her time.

The tree expert attended the meeting to discuss agenda item TC3017 and provided a strong view as to why the town council should not fell the Willow Tree in the centre of the town, citing the Glendale report stating the recommendations, which had some time ago been implemented by the town council. He suggested that further ongoing maintenance and inspection regime should suffice. The Attendee remained at the meeting in case further input was sought from him when the relevant agenda item was discussed.

A resident of Festival road/member of the town council's Event working group wished to raise a point in relation to the planned barn dance planned for the King's Coronation in that council should ensure that whichever company was chosen they should be able to facilitate dancing outside of the community centre. The Chair thanked the resident for her input.

TC3000 To receive apologies

Apologies were received from town Cllrs Marcus Dixon, Debbie Curtis and Theresa Watt. Apologies were also given by ward cllr Mattie Ross

TC3001 To receive declarations of interest

There were no declarations of interest

TC3002 To approve the minutes of the Town Council meeting of 13th February 2023

Council **APPROVED** the minutes as a true and accurate record of the meeting

By agreement, the Chair brought forward the following agenda items for discussion.

TC3010 To consider and approve:

1. an application for financial support from Stonehouse Community Association

2. the town council representative/s to act on the town council's behalf on the Stonehouse Community Association's Board of Trustees

Two Trustees of the Stonehouse Community Association (SCA) were invited to answer questions.

The following questions were raised:

- How Trustees were chosen they were chosen from local businesses and volunteers
- The amended constitution refers to the council representative as an honorary position - does this include voting rights - it was confirmed that it did not include voting rights but in time full voting rights will be given; this issue was pressed and the Trustees considered the change would take place in the very near future. There was some disappointment but acceptance of the situation amongst council members.
- Had anyone been asked to leave and refused use of the community centre. The Trustees confirmed that there hadn't been.

The Trustees were clear about the state of the community Association's finances in that if they did not receive additional funding imminently, they would be at risk of folding; they highlighted the affect of the significant reduction in income levels over the past two years which has necessitated the use of their reserves. It was acknowledged that whilst the funding application was for a total of £6737.80, the association's needs were significantly greater. It was acknowledged that the council's current grants policy could not be used to pay for services already purchased. On this basis, a grant was considered for general use by the Association; Cllr Callinan proposed a grant of £10,000 from the town council's General Reserves; this was seconded by Cllr Gibbs and unanimously agreed. Council APPROVED a grant award of £10,000 (from its General Reserves) to Stonehouse Community Association.

Council also RESOLVED to establish Cllr Mark Edwards as a Trustee on the Association's Board of Trustees

TC3015 To consider for approval a proposal from Stonehouse Town Football Club for the repair of the Oldends Lane Pavilion building

The Chair attended the meeting to answer questions on the football club's proposal to effect repairs resulting from the recent water damage to the pavilion.

The question of whether the work would be certified was raised - the Chair of STFC made it clear that it would be certified trades people working on the building and that the Clerk will receive the appropriate certification for all works completed.

The Clerk stated that for the town council to undertake the repair works, the cost would have been much greater than is being offered by the football club via its proposal; this can be demonstrated through quotes received by Officers soon after the initial flooding incident. There was mention of the council claiming on its insurance however, this would only be for damage that had been caused and would not include the replacement of all the pipe joints in the loft of the building.

Council **RESOLVED** to **ACCEPT** Stonehouse Town Council's proposal to undertake the following works (with full Certification) on the Pavilion over the coming months and to waive the annual payment of £1,700 for the club's use of the pavilion and football pitches for the 2022/23 financial year.

TC3017 To receive the Minutes of the Environment Committee meeting 20th February '23 and to approve:

Committee's recommendations:

- 1. to fell the trees recommended for felling at Doverow Woods Council APPROVED the recommendation.
- 2. to pollard the willow trees at Stagholt Brook Council APPROVED the recommendation.
- 3. to undertake other minor tree works recommended by Glendale

Council APPROVED the recommendation.

4. to undertake all works using Stroud District Council's preferred contractor under their current Framework Contract for arboriculture works, providing the contractor was available. There was some doubt about the value for money achieved through the use of a framework contractor. It was explained that this was a safe option from a health and safety perspective and that the value for money will have been determined as a result of a tender exercise.

Council APPROVED the use of Stroud District Council Framework contractor to undertake the town council's tree works providing the company is able to do so.

5. to consider felling the Willow tree in the High street, subject to discussion at Full Council due to the history and significance of the Willow in the Town.

Questions were asked of the local tree expert who was happy to provide responses to inform the debate. The recent fatal incident involving a child being killed by a falling tree elsewhere in the UK was raised and it was agreed that this could not be used as an active comparison with the scenario being discussed.

Mention was made of Glendale's recommendations detailed in its tree report dated 9th September 2022, follow-up advice given by Glendale in the company's email dated 20th October 2022 and the assessment by 'Treecalc', a Bristol based company whose expertise is in assessing the health of trees and associated risks. Also mentioned were the additional preventative measures taken by the town council ie movement of street furniture from target area.

Cllr Kambites proposed 'Not to fell the Willow tree and continue to take all recommended preventative measures'. The proposal was seconded by Cllr Neil Gibbs. The Chair asked for a recorded vote - this fell in favour of the proposal with only one vote against (Cllr Gary Powell)

The Chair reverted to the natural order of the agenda

TC3003 To receive an update on the calling of a Bye-Election to be held on 4th April '23

The two Nominees were NOTED

TC3004 To receive reports from Chair of Town Council and town councillors

The Chair - highlighted the new Welfare unit at the football ground Cllr Davis - stated that the Verney Field Town Green application was submitted two weeks ago - he offered thanks to all who helped Cllr Callinan - gave thanks to all who helped achieve TPO's for the trees and woodland at Verney Fields

Cllr Kambites - sat on the Steering Committee for the Big Solar Project - confirmed that funding for the officer would run out in a few months - still looking for owners/managers of large building to volunteer on the scheme and that Park School had applied Cllr Edwards - reinstated the Oldends Lane Development Working Group and had considered priority projects

TC3005 To receive and request reports from County and District Councillors

There were no Ward or County Councillors in attendance at the meeting and no written reports were forwarded to the town council

TC3006 To receive RFO's budget report and bank reconciliation for February '23

Council NOTED the budget report detailing total Actual Net Expenditure of £375,089.23, Actual Net Income of £386,489.46 and Income and Expenditure Reserve Movements of £10,000 and £78,425.14 respectively.

The Clerk stated that the bank reconciliation had not been completed in time for the meeting on this occasion and would therefore be presented to the April Council meeting.

TC3007 To approve the latest payment list

The Clerk explained that reference to Bramble lane referred to Verney Fields; payment was necessary for the pollution tubes that were mislaid; the reason for the relatively high energy bill for the pavilion was due to the weather and the need to limit further flooding

Council APPROVED all payments totalling £9,874.71

TC3008 To update Council on the transfer of funds from its Lloyds account to CCLA

Council NOTED the transfer of £449,288 from its Lloyds bank account to CCLA on the 10^{th} February '23

TC3009 To approve a grant application from the Baptist Church

The town council did not receive the expected grant application in time for the meeting

TC3010 To consider and approve:

Council APPROVED the following recommendations:

- 1. To make a payment of £3000 to Stroud District Council as a contribution towards the Festival's activities
- 2. To allow the events working group to spend a further £500 on other incidental activities and supplies in support of the event, including the 'Hook a Duck' equipment as and when required and to report expenditure retrospectively

All funding to be through the event's Earmarked Reserve.

TC3012 To approve the 'Events' working group's planned expenditure for the King's Coronation

It was highlighted that any further bunting should be of a design that would enable its use at other events. It was explained that this would be the case. The issue of purchasing mugs for children at private schools was discussed.

Council APPROVED the following recommendation:

1. Approval is given for items of expenditure 1,2 and 3 with flexibility given on total cost based on final quantities providing costs are kept within budget - total cost estimated at £3,350

TC3013 To agree a response to Stroud District Council on the application of a temporary road closure of Boakes Drive for the Canal Spring Festival

Council APPROVED the following response to the consultation:

'The town council had no objections to the proposed temporary road closure provided residents were happy'

TC3014 To approve the town council's preferred grounds maintenance contractor for the 2023/24 financial year

The Clerk stated that although Council had given its approval to allow the final decision to be made on awarding the grounds maintenance contract to TW Hawkins by the Chair, Vice Chair and the town clerk, the clerk had time to bring the matter back to council with confirmation that the quotation received from T W Hawkins was the only one received.

Council RESOLVED to award the one year grounds maintenance contract to T W Hawkins for the financial year 2023/24 to the total value of £24,780 plus vat.

- TC3018 To consider and approve the details of an agreement with Stonehouse Market CIC

Cllr John Callinan provided an overview of the discussions and email exchanges between the council representatives and one of the Market Directors and a committee member. The Council representatives maintained that the council was very eager to foster good relations with the Market CIC and wished the Town Market every success. Unfortunately, the Directors had been unable to meet to discuss the details of the draft agreement prior to the scheduled council meeting. There was concern amongst members that the financial accounts provided by the Market CIC were somewhat limited and did not allow the council to properly consider them in order to justify rendering financial support in the form of relaxing its charges for the use of the town green; Council's view was that the Directors should have made themselves available for such an important issue, especially as the council's meeting timetable was provided in detail, in advance.

A vote was taken to suspend Standing Orders to allow the meeting to continue beyond 9.30pm

Discussion continued with a question mark over the issue of how the market could continue based on the financial model they had been using and the limited amount of funding they have in reserve. Council APPROVED the draft agreement on the proviso that should there be a necessity to modify it, the agreement would be brought back to council for further consideration. It was noted that the draft agreement could be used more widely in terms of its application to any market wishing to use the town green.

YOUTHWORK PROVISION REPORT
DECEMBER 2022 - FEBRUARY 2023

1. OVERVIEW

Stonehouse youth provision is in a healthy place. Engagement from young people with our sessions and the youth work team is consistently high and The Pod is full of life! Isak is meeting more and more young people with his work in Maidenhill School and the need for additional support with vulnerable and challenging young people is increasing. Working with more young people will inevitably lead to safeguarding concerns surfacing and the Pod has been no exception to this. Whilst the young people are presently engaging respectfully with the staff and each other, there is a notable increase in risky behaviours such as casual drug use, vaping and sexualised behaviour. What is positive is that this cohort is developing a sense of family and are demonstrating significant trust in the youth workers as we have more of these types of conversation and receive disclosures. Isak is working closely with the school, the PCSOs and other agencies to ensure that each young person is signposted to the right care when the need arises.

As in the previous quarter, Food Fridays has continued to be a highly meaningful and supportive project for many of the young people at the Pod. A number of the young people who already attended the sessions are on free school meals and will have benefitted from this provision, but there are also some new people attending as a result. The Door and the young people appreciate the contribution of Stonehouse Town Council to make this provision possible that provides hope, during what is a very dark time for a lot of families. The Door is now a HAF provider, to continue to take a leading role in supporting_vulnerable young people in the Stroud District. As one can read below, pressure on young people's mental health is at an all-time high and the waiting list for our intensive support service matches this demand. There is a desperate need for more caring, trustworthy adults who are able to listen and learn to join our volunteer mentoring team.

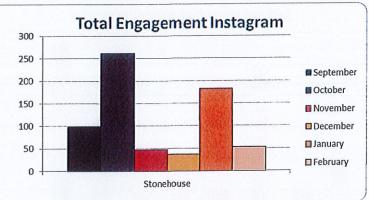

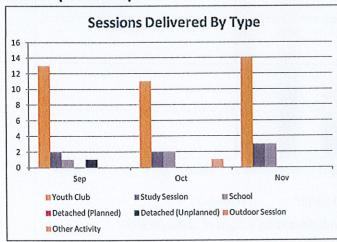

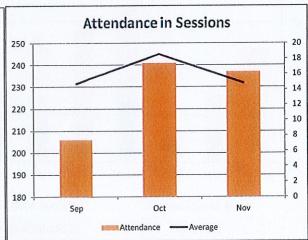




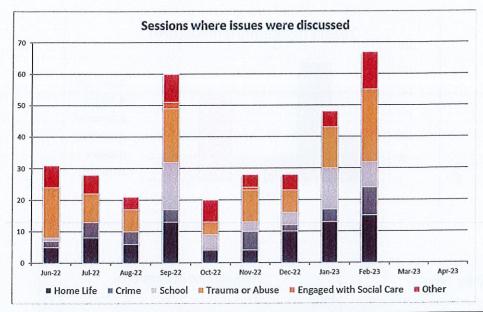
Note: Average engagements with young people during Maidenhill School Sessions - 74

THE POD (SEP-NOV 22)



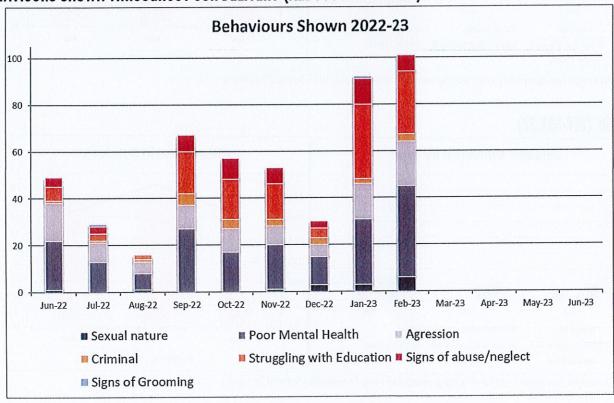


Note: Average engagements with young people during Maidenhill School Sessions - 112

3. OVERVIEW

DECEMBER

There was continued the trend of increased participation from young people in the Pod. The month started with Stonehouse Goodwill, where our stall was abuzz with activity and young people taking a lead in running the games, even collecting money for The Door! In sessions, the engagement again has increased and the centre has been getting close capacity on more than one occasion. This contrasts remarkably with 5 years ago, where this time of year would yield quiet sessions with sometimes no young people turning up. Not only does this demonstrate how much young people value the provision, but how much demand there is for youth



services in general in this post pandemic era. The atmosphere during sessions has been incredibly positive, with young people setting the own example to their peers of respect and hospitality. There has also been continued success with Food Fridays, regularly feeding over 20 young people with cooked food - even a Christmas roast, which the young people have shown their appreciation for.

JANUARY

The Youthwork Team have done a great job of carrying the positive momentum built before Christmas into the new year, avoiding the typical January slump. The young people were very excited to return to the Pod, quickly settling back into the space and chatting away about their Christmas breaks. Sadly, not all those experiences are positive ones, with a number of young people reporting challenging financial situations at

home at present, as well some sharing about unsettled home lives and disillusionment with education. There is an appetite from young people to feel a part of something in the circumstances that we live with in this moment and there is a real sense of family being built with the current cohort. In Stonehouse and across The Door, we have worked with Healthwatch Gloucestershire to support them with their young people's mental health project, where they have been talking to young people about their mental health to conduct a key piece of research. When asked the question 'what helps you with your mental health?' the young people



said, time and again, just how much the Pod means to them in supporting their mental health.

FEBRUARY



Staffing and recruitment has been a significant challenge in February but the youth work team came together to ensure the same quality of delivery and modelled the very tenets we hope to see in young people. There was much excitement for the arrival of the new sofa which, with some clever manoeuvring of interior space, has amazingly created a better layout and more space in the Pod, to be more welcoming and cosier for the young people. A small focus group of young people were tasked to redesign one

of the small rooms in the Pod to become a cosy space, to provide somewhere for quiet and retreat, particularly with those with neurodiversity in mind. There is hope for the materials to be in place and the work to be completed by Easter. On Valentine's Day, there was a planned session around healthy relationships (with friends, family, professionals, romance etc). There were many positive interactions with the activity and learning outcomes for the young people. However, there was a bittersweet moment when a young person finally opened up and disclosed that they were having self-esteem issues and had depression. It was important to provide the platform where this young person felt safe enough to speak, which is the first step on the road to healing. As we have found, food has been an extremely useful tool for garnering meaningful outcomes from our young people, and this month has proven the same. All the Food Fridays were great successes where the young people have reengaged with the activity, not just simply eating the food (which goes quickly!) but also contributing to meal planning, preparation and even cleaning up!

4. EXTRA FUNDING

Key Cafe - This has continued to provide a well valued space for the young people who are attending regularly. Even though this is a smaller cohort to the usual Pod sessions, the young people that come need those conditions to feel able to have important conversations with the youth workers, as well as get some crucial work done. From Isak's conversations with young people in Maidenhill, the demand for a revision space will increase, as the exam season in May approaches.

Digital youth work — It is exciting to announce that the Barnwood trust have agreed to fund the first year's provision of a pioneering youth work in the digital sphere. Isak will be spearheading it, with the aim to set up a replicable and outcome generating program that reaches young people that feel most comfortable interacting in a digital capacity, as well as giving the cohort in Stonehouse and our other centres a vehicle to engage further afield and make new friends. Watch this space!

6. SAFEGUARDING

There were no new notifiable safeguarding concerns this quarter only an update on an ongoing social services case. There has been a worrying rise in casual substance misuse and vaping including an allegation of grooming by a local shopkeeper to provide vapes in return for jobs.

7. COMMUNITY YOUTHWORK

Breakfast Club - In January, a joint venture between The Door, Sportily, and the Stonehouse Baptist Church started to provide breakfast for Maidenhill students on Thursday mornings. There has regularly been 10 to 20 students attend, who can help themselves to food, hang out in a warm, friendly space and receive encouragement before the school day starts.

Maidenhill - Isak has continued to regularly attend Maidenhill on a Tuesday lunch time, engaging with the young people and catching up with the teachers and pastoral staff. This is proving to be a vital piece of work support the school with some of their most vulnerable students as well as being able to canvas new young people for the Pod and even do a bit of research!

Stonehouse Goodwill – Isak worked with Valerie and the local council to provide a stall at this year's Stonehouse goodwill event as well as getting some young people to volunteer. It is always such a privilege to participate in such a great event.

Community Safety Partnership & Community Response Network – Isak and members of our Intensive Support team at The Door continued to represent the young people of Stonehouse at both these meetings.

8. PLANS FOR NEXT QUARTER

In light of the extra funding from Stonehouse Town Council to fund Community Youthwork available from April, this new section will determine how The Door proposes to spend this budget in partnership with the council. Below are the first items for spending approval for the two month period from 1^{st} April – 31^{st} May 2023.

- a. Breakfast Club Isak's time, 1 hour per week term time only. Cost £186
- b. Maidenhill Support- Isak's time, 2 hours per week, term time only. Cost £372
- c. Cotswold Canal Event Isak's time (including planning) + 1 additional worker and resources. Cost £600
- d. Trip See additional document. Cost approx £1750-3000. This will be invoiced separately in arrears.
- e. Coronation Event Isak's time (including planning). Cost £263.50
- f. Food Friday 7 weeks provision in April/May and Isak's time. Cost £535.50
- g. Anything from STC?
- h. Isak Community Work Isak's time, 2 hours per week. Cost £496

Total for April/May 2023 = £2543.00 not including the trip

In addition to the above funding requests here are some of the plans for the next quarter within the sessions

Forest Green Rovers – FGR have agreed to deliver a 1 hour sports session within one of our weekly sessions per week over the summer period. What an exciting opportunity that could lead to other positive activities and resourcing for young people

Easter Holidays - The team are looking for to providing high quality Easter themed holiday provision including being a part of the HAF programme, where food will be provided.

Summer Programme - The team will be looking at a new Summer Programme for the youth work delivery during the summer holidays. We hope to provide at least 2 trips over this period.

Substance Misuse Training – The Community Youth Workers will be receiving training from InfoBuzz to help tackle the recent substance misuse that is being witnessed. Funding has also been allocated to training one of the team to Level 3.

10. CASE STUDIES

Case Study 1

Young people A and B are twins that have been attending Pod since the start of the academic year and have exhibited lots of challenging behaviour. Slowly but surely the youth workers have been getting them on side. This last quarter the team needed to reinforce a boundary with A, where B helped by encouraging A to have the conversation with the youth workers and by the end of the meeting both A and B expressed how much they value for the youth club, and the need to respect the boundaries and the youth workers, which is no small feat for this pair!

Case Study 2

Young person C has been spoken about before in previous reports. He has found The Pod to be one of his safe spaces and has started a relationship with a mentor. This last month has been particularly challenging for him, and as a result he has been pushing boundaries at home and at school and finding himself in trouble. Thankfully C has still turned up to The Pod, and engaged with friends and Youth Workers alike. One of the other young people has been so concerned for C that he has taken it upon himself to accompany C back to his guardians home. The Youth Workers were so proud of this other young person and highly commended him when he returned; what a show of the value that the friendships formed at The Pod can have.

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PROPOSAL TO ENABLE YOUTHWORK STAFF TO ORGANISE SUMMER TRIPS

FOR YOUNG PEOPLE



Last year The Door organised a highly successful trip to Airhop. Since then it has delivered smaller trips to Ninja Warrior, Gloucester Cathedral and Weston Super-Mare. Many of our trips also provide a hot meal for young people. The Door wishes to pioneer annual programme of trips and activities for disadvantaged young people attending our youth centres and others who would not otherwise have the opportunity of a holiday - a demand which is considerably higher in the current crisis. Without our trips and activities these young people would be largely unoccupied at home.

In these circumstances there is an increased risk of anti-social behaviour particularly in the rural and isolated areas of our district where there are few, if any, diversionary activities. With nothing much to do, it is also not unusual for young people to become preoccupied with social media and gaming as a form of entertainment leading to them being closeted for days on end.

Our programme of trips and activities combats these circumstances by encouraging them out of their houses to get involved in exciting and physically engaging activities. While a key element of our programme is that the trips and activities are educational in the widest sense, they are primarily designed so that young people can have fun and make friends. By mixing up young people from across the district any historic friction between communities can be mitigated and overcome.



As such we are currently seeking funds to enable us to offer trips for this Summer 2023. We would welcome a contribution from your fund to enable two trips for the Stonehouse young people (totalling between £3500-6000). The costs are set out 'per trip' to help your decision-making process. We try to keep costs to a minimum for young people, where free spaces would be offered to those in most need and a small contribution from others to ensure buy-in.

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TYPICAL COSTS PER TRIP

Costs of trips vary substantially based on the length of the trip and the activities undertaken. The cost of a typical full day trip with one minibus (taking up to 18 young people with a £75 contribution from young people) to e.g. Airhop is as follows:

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STONEHOUSE TOWN COUNCIL FINANCIAL REGULATIONS 2022

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1. General

- 1.1. These Financial Regulations govern the conduct of financial management by the Council and may only be amended or varied by resolution of the Council. Financial Regulations are one of the Council's three governing policy documents providing procedural guidance for members and officers. Financial Regulations must be observed in conjunction with the Council's standing orders¹ and any individual financial regulations relating to contracts.
- 1.2. The Council is responsible in law for ensuring that its financial management is adequate and effective and that the Council has a sound system of internal control which facilitates the effective exercise of the Council's functions, including arrangements for the management of risk.
- 1.3. The Council's accounting control systems must include measures:
 - for the timely production of accounts;
 - that provide for the safe and efficient safeguarding of public money;
 - to prevent and detect inaccuracy and fraud; and
 - identifying the duties of officers.
- 1.4. These Financial Regulations demonstrate how the Council meets these responsibilities and requirements.
- 1.5. At least once a year, prior to approving the Annual Governance Statement, the Council must review the effectiveness of its system of internal control which shall be in accordance with proper practices.
- 1.6. Deliberate or willful breach of these regulations by an employee may give rise to disciplinary proceedings.
- 1.7. Members of Council are expected to follow the instructions within these regulations and not to entice employees to breach them. Failure to follow instructions within these regulations brings the office of councillor into disrepute.
- 1.8. The Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) holds a statutory office to be appointed by the Council. The Clerk has been appointed as RFO for this Council and these regulations will apply accordingly.

1.9. The RFO;

- · acts under the policy direction of the Council;
- administers the Council's financial affairs in accordance with all Acts, Regulations and proper practices;
- determines on behalf of the Council its accounting records and accounting control systems;
- ensures the accounting control systems are observed;

- maintains the accounting records of the Council up to date in accordance with proper practices;
- assists the Council to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of its resources; and
- produces financial management information as required by the Council.
- 1.10. The accounting records determined by the RFO shall be sufficient to show and explain the Council's transactions and to enable the RFO to ensure that any income and expenditure account and statement of balances, or record of receipts and payments and additional information, as the case may be, or management information prepared for the Council from time to time comply with the Accounts and Audit Regulations.
- 1.11. The accounting records determined by the RFO shall in particular contain:
 - entries from day to day of all sums of money received and expended by the Council and the matters to which the income and expenditure or receipts and payments account relate;
 - a record of the assets and liabilities of the Council; and
 - wherever relevant, a record of the Council's income and expenditure in relation to claims made, or to be made, for any contribution, grant or subsidy.
- 1.12. The accounting control systems determined by the RFO shall include:
 - procedures to ensure that the financial transactions of the Council are recorded as soon as reasonably practicable and as accurately and reasonably as possible;
 - procedures to enable the prevention and detection of inaccuracies and fraud and the ability to reconstruct any lost records;
 - identification of the duties of officers dealing with financial transactions and division of responsibilities of those officers in relation to significant transactions;
 - procedures to ensure that uncollectable amounts, including any bad debts are not submitted to the
 Council for approval to be written off except with the approval of the RFO and that the approvals are
 shown in the accounting records; and
 - measures to ensure that risk is properly managed.
- 1.13. The Council is not empowered by these Regulations or otherwise to delegate certain specified decisions. In particular any decision regarding:
 - setting the final budget or the precept (council tax requirement);
 - approving accounting statements;
 - approving an annual governance statement;
 - borrowing;
 - writing off bad debts;

- · declaring eligibility for the General Power of Competence; and
- addressing recommendations in any report from the internal or external auditors, shall be a matter for the full Council only.

1.14. In addition, the Council must:

- determine and keep under regular review the bank mandate for all Council bank accounts;
- approve any grant or a single commitment in excess of £5,000; and
- in respect of the annual salary for any employee have regard to recommendations about annual salaries of employees made by the relevant committee in accordance with its terms of reference.
- 1.15. In these financial regulations, references to the Accounts and Audit Regulations or 'the regulations' shall mean the regulations issued under the provisions of section 27 of the Audit Commission Act 1998, or any superseding legislation, and then in force unless otherwise specified.

In these financial regulations the term 'proper practice' or 'proper practices' shall refer to guidance issued in *Governance and Accountability for Local Councils - a Practitioners' Guide (England)* issued by the Joint Practitioners Advisory Group (JPAG), available from the websites of NALC and the Society for Local Council Clerks (SLCC).

2. Accounting and audit (internal and external)

- 2.1. All accounting procedures and financial records of the Council shall be determined by the RFO in accordance with the Accounts and Audit Regulations, appropriate guidance and proper practices.
- 2.2. On a regular basis, at least once in each quarter, and at each financial year end, a member other than the Chair or a bank signatory shall be appointed to verify bank reconciliations (for all accounts) produced by the RFO. The member shall sign the reconciliations and the original bank statements (or similar document) as evidence of verification. This activity shall on conclusion be reported, including any exceptions, to and noted by the Council or Business Committee.
- 2.3. The RFO shall complete the annual statement of accounts, annual report, and any related documents of the Council contained in the Annual Return (as specified in proper practices) as soon as practicable after the end of the financial year and having certified the accounts shall submit them and report thereon to the Council within the timescales set by the Accounts and Audit Regulations.
- 2.4. The Council shall ensure that there is an adequate and effective system of internal audit of its accounting records, and of its system of internal control in accordance with proper practices. Any officer or member of the Council shall make available such documents and records as appear to the Council to be necessary for the purpose of the audit and shall, as directed by the Council, supply the RFO, internal auditor, or external auditor with such information and explanation as the Council considers necessary for that purpose.
- 2.5. The internal auditor shall be appointed by and shall carry out the work in relation to internal controls required by the Council in accordance with proper practices.
- 2.6. The internal auditor shall:

- be competent and independent of the financial operations of the Council;
- report to Council in writing, or in person, on a regular basis with a minimum of one annual written report during each financial year;
- to demonstrate competence, objectivity and independence, be free from any actual or perceived conflicts of interest, including those arising from family relationships; and
- have no involvement in the financial decision making, management or control of the Council
- 2.7. Internal or external auditors may not under any circumstances:
 - perform any operational duties for the Council;
 - initiate or approve accounting transactions; or
 - direct the activities of any Council employee, except to the extent that such employees have been appropriately assigned to assist the internal auditor.
- 2.8. For the avoidance of doubt, in relation to internal audit the terms 'independent' and 'independence' shall have the same meaning as is described in proper practices.
- 2.9. The RFO shall make arrangements for the exercise of electors' rights in relation to the accounts including the opportunity to inspect the accounts, books, and vouchers and display or publish any notices and statements of account required by Audit Commission Act 1998, or any superseding legislation, and the Accounts and Audit Regulations.
- 2.10. The RFO shall, without undue delay, bring to the attention of all councillors any correspondence or report from internal or external auditors.

3. Annual estimates (budget) and forward planning

- 3.1. The RFO must each year, by no later than November, prepare detailed estimates of all receipts and payments including the use of reserves and all sources of funding for the following financial year in the form of a budget to be considered by the relevant committees and the Council.
- 3.2. The Council shall consider annual budget proposals in relation to the Council's three year forecast of revenue and capital receipts and payments including recommendations for the use of reserves and sources of funding and update the forecast accordingly.
- 3.3. The Council shall fix the precept (council tax requirement), and relevant basic amount of council tax to be levied for the ensuing financial year not later than by the end of January each year. The RFO shall issue the precept to the billing authority and shall supply each member with a copy of the approved annual budget.
- 3.4. The approved annual budget shall form the basis of financial control for the ensuing year.

4. Budgetary control and authority to spend

4.1. Expenditure on revenue items may be authorised up to the amounts included for that class of expenditure in the approved budget. This authority is to be determined by:

- the Council for all items over £5,000;
- a duly delegated committee of the Council for items up to £5,000; or
- the Clerk, in conjunction with Chair of Council or Chair of the appropriate committee, for any items below £1000.

Such authority is to be evidenced by a minute or by an authorisation slip duly signed by the Clerk, and where necessary also by the appropriate Chair.

Contracts may not be disaggregated to avoid controls imposed by these regulations.

- 4.2. No expenditure may be authorised that will exceed the amount provided in the revenue budget for that class of expenditure other than by resolution of the Council, or duly delegated committee. During the budget year and with the approval of Council having considered fully the implications for public services, unspent and available amounts may be moved to other budget headings or to an earmarked reserve as appropriate ('virement').
- 4.3. Unspent provisions in the revenue or capital budgets for completed projects shall not be carried forward to a subsequent year.
- 4.4. The salary budgets are to be reviewed at least annually in October for the following financial year and such review shall be evidenced by a hard copy schedule signed by the Clerk and the Chair of Council or relevant committee. The RFO will inform committees of any changes impacting on their budget requirement for the coming year in good time.
- 4.5. In cases of extreme risk to the delivery of Council services, the Clerk may authorise revenue expenditure on behalf of the Council which in the Clerk's judgement it is necessary to carry out. Such expenditure includes repair, replacement or other work, whether or not there is any budgetary provision for the expenditure, subject to a limit of £3,000. The Clerk shall report such action to the Chair as soon as possible and to the Council as soon as practicable thereafter.
- 4.6. No expenditure shall be authorised in relation to any capital project and no contract entered into or tender accepted involving capital expenditure unless the Council is satisfied that the necessary funds are available and the requisite borrowing approval has been obtained.
- 4.7. All capital works shall be administered in accordance with the Council's standing orders and financial regulations relating to contracts.
- 4.8. The RFO shall regularly provide the Council with a statement of receipts and payments to date under each head of the budgets, comparing actual expenditure to the appropriate date against that planned as shown in the budget. These statements are to be prepared at least at the end of each financial quarter and shall show explanations of material variances. For this purpose "material" shall be in excess of 15% of the budget.
- 4.9. Changes in earmarked reserves shall be approved by Council as part of the budgetary control process.
- 5. Banking arrangements and authorisation of payments

- 5.1. The Council's banking arrangements, including the bank mandate, shall be made by the RFO and approved by the Council; banking arrangements may not be delegated to a committee. They shall be regularly reviewed for safety and efficiency.
- 5.2. The RFO shall prepare a schedule of payments requiring authorisation, forming part of the Agenda for the Meeting and, together with the relevant invoices, present the schedule to Council or Business Committee. The Council or Committee shall review the schedule for compliance and, having satisfied itself shall authorise payment by a resolution of the Council or Business Committee. The approved schedule shall be ruled off and initialled by the Chair of the Meeting. A detailed list of all payments shall be disclosed within or as an attachment to the minutes of the meeting at which payment was authorised. Personal payments (including salaries, wages, expenses and any payment made in relation to the termination of a contract of employment) may be summarised to remove public access to any personal information.
- 5.3. All invoices for payment shall be examined, verified and certified by the RFO to confirm that the work, goods or services to which each invoice relates has been received, carried out, examined and represents expenditure previously approved by the Council.
- 5.4. The RFO shall examine invoices for arithmetical accuracy and analyse them to the appropriate expenditure heading. The RFO shall take all steps to pay all invoices submitted, and which are in order, at the next available Council or Business Committee meeting.
- 5.5. The RFO shall have delegated authority to authorise the payment of items only in the following circumstances:
 - a) If a payment is necessary to avoid a charge to interest under the Late Payment of Commercial Debts (Interest) Act 1998, and the due date for payment is before the next scheduled meeting of Council or Business Committee, where the RFO certifies that there is no dispute or other reason to delay payment, provided that a list of such payments shall be submitted to the next appropriate meeting of Council or Business Committee;
 - b) An expenditure item authorised under 5.6 below (continuing contracts and obligations including materials and maintenance) provided that a list of such payments shall be submitted to the next appropriate meeting of Council or Business Committee; or
 - c) fund transfers within the Council's banking and investment arrangements up to the sum of £50,000 subject to the requirements of CCLA, provided that a list of such payments shall be submitted to the next appropriate meeting of Council or Business Committee. Authorisation of transfer greater than £50,000 shall be determined by the RFO in consultation with the Chair and/or Vice Chair of Council and reported back
- 5.6. For each financial year the RFO shall draw up a list of due payments which arise on a regular basis as the result of a continuing contract, statutory duty, or obligation (such as but not exclusively) Salaries, PAYE and NI, Superannuation Fund and regular maintenance contracts and the like for which Council may authorise payment for the year provided that the requirements of regulation 4.1 (Budgetary Controls) are adhered to.
- 5.7. A record of regular payments made under 5.6 above shall be drawn up and be signed by two members on each and every occasion when payment is authorised thus controlling the risk of duplicated payments being authorised and / or made.

- 5.8. In respect of grants a duly authorised committee shall approve expenditure within any limits set by Council and in accordance with any policy statement approved by Council. Any Revenue or Capital Grant in excess of £5,000 shall before payment, be subject to ratification by resolution of the Council.
- 5.9. Members are subject to the Code of Conduct that has been adopted by the Council and shall comply with the Code and Standing Orders when a decision to authorise or instruct payment is made in respect of a matter in which they have a disclosable pecuniary or other interest, unless a dispensation has been granted.
- 5.10. The Council will aim to rotate the duties of members in these Regulations so that onerous duties are shared out as evenly as possible over time.
- 5.11. Any changes in the recorded details of suppliers, such as bank account records, shall be approved in writing by a member.

6. Instructions for the making of payments

- 6.1. The Council will make safe and efficient arrangements for the making of its payments.
- 6.2. Following authorisation under Financial Regulation 5 above, the Council, a duly delegated committee or, if so delegated, the Clerk or RFO shall give instruction that a payment shall be made.
- 6.3. All payments shall be affected in accordance with a resolution of Council or duly delegated authority.
- 6.4. All payments shall be made by BACS or CHAPS methods provided that the instructions for each payment are signed, or otherwise evidenced, by two authorised bank signatories, are retained and any payments are reported to Council as made. The approval of the use of BACS or CHAPS shall be renewed by resolution of the Council at least every two years.
- 6.5. If thought appropriate by the Council, payment for utility supplies (energy, telephone and water) and any National Non-Domestic Rates may be made by variable direct debit provided that the instructions are signed by two members and any payments are reported to Council as made. The approval of the use of a variable direct debit shall be renewed by resolution of the Council at least every two years.
- 6.6. If thought appropriate by the Council, payment for certain items (principally salaries) may be made by banker's standing order or electronic transfer provided that the instructions are signed, or otherwise evidenced by two members, are retained and any payments are reported to Council as made. The approval of the use of a banker's standing order shall be renewed by resolution of the Council at least every two years.
- 6.7. Cheques or orders for payment drawn on the bank account in accordance with the schedule as presented to Council or Business Committee shall be signed by two members of Council and countersigned by the RFO or authorised Officer in accordance with a resolution instructing that payment. A member who is a bank signatory, having a connection by virtue of family or business relationships with the beneficiary of a payment, should not, under normal circumstances, be a signatory to the payment in question.
- 6.8. To indicate agreement of the details shown on the cheque or order for payment with the counterfoil and the invoice or similar documentation, the signatories shall each also initial the cheque counterfoil.

- 6.9. Cheques or orders for payment shall not normally be presented for signature other than at a Council or Business Committee meeting (including immediately before or after such a meeting). Any signatures obtained away from such meetings shall be reported to the Council or Business Committee at the next convenient meeting.
- 6.10. If thought appropriate by the Council payment for certain items may be made by internet banking transfer provided evidence is retained showing which members approved the payment.
- 6.11. Where a computer requires use of a personal identification number (PIN) or other password(s), for access to the Council's records on that computer, a note shall be made of the PIN and Passwords and shall be handed to and retained by the Chair of Council in a sealed dated envelope. This envelope may not be opened other than in the presence of two other councillors. After the envelope has been opened, in any circumstances, the PIN and / or passwords shall be changed as soon as practicable. The fact that the sealed envelope has been opened, in whatever circumstances, shall be reported to all members immediately and formally to the next available meeting of the Council. This will not be required for a member's personal computer used only for remote authorisation of bank payments.
- 6.12. No employee or councillor shall disclose any PIN or password, relevant to the working of the Council or its bank accounts, to any person not authorised in writing by the Council or a duly delegated committee.
- 6.13. Regular back-up copies of the records on any computer shall be made and shall be stored securely away from the computer in question, and preferably off site.
- 6.14. The Council, and any members using computers for the Council's financial business, shall ensure that anti-virus, anti-spyware and firewall software with automatic updates, together with a high level of security, is used.
- 6.15. Where internet banking arrangements are made with any bank, the RFO shall be appointed as the Service Administrator. The bank mandate approved by the Council shall identify a number of councillors who will be authorised to approve transactions on those accounts. The bank mandate will state clearly the amounts of payments that can be instructed by the use of the Service Administrator alone, or by the Service Administrator with a stated number of approvals.
- 6.16. Access to any internet banking accounts will be directly to the access page (which may be saved under "favourites"), and not through a search engine or e-mail link. Remembered or saved passwords facilities must not be used on any computer used for council banking work. Breach of this Regulation will be treated as a very serious matter under these regulations.
- 6.17. Changes to account details for suppliers, which are used for internet banking may only be changed on written hard copy notification by the supplier and supported by hard copy authority for change signed by the RFO. A programme of regular checks of standing data with suppliers will be followed.
- 6.18. Any Debit Card issued for use will be specifically restricted to the RFO or authorised officer and will also be restricted to a single transaction maximum value of £1,000 unless authorised by Council or Business Committee in writing before any order is placed.
- 6.19 The council will not maintain any form of cash float. All cash received must be banked intact. Any payments made in cash by the RFO (for example for postage or minor stationery items) shall be refunded on a regular basis, at least quarterly.

7. Payment of salaries

- 7.1. As an employer, the Council shall make arrangements to meet fully the statutory requirements placed on all employers by PAYE and National Insurance legislation. The payment of all salaries shall be made in accordance with payroll records and the rules of PAYE and National Insurance currently operating, and salary rates shall be as agreed by Council, or duly delegated committee.
- 7.2. Payment of salaries and payment of deductions from salary such as may be required to be made for tax, national insurance and pension contributions, or similar statutory or discretionary deductions must be made in accordance with the payroll records and on the appropriate dates stipulated in employment contracts, provided that each payment is reported to the next available Council meeting, as set out in these regulations above.
- 7.3. No changes shall be made to any employee's pay, emoluments, or terms and conditions of employment without the prior consent of the Council.
- 7.4. Each and every payment to employees of net salary and to the appropriate creditor of the statutory and discretionary deductions shall be recorded in a separate confidential record (confidential cash book). This confidential record is not open to inspection or review (under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 or otherwise) other than:
 - a) by any councillor who can demonstrate a need to know;
 - b) by the internal auditor;
 - c) by the external auditor; or
 - d) by any person authorised under Audit Commission Act 1998, or any superseding legislation.
- 7.5. The total of such payments in each calendar month shall be reported with all other payments as made as may be required under these Financial Regulations, to ensure that only payments due for the period have actually been paid.
- 7.6. An effective system of personal performance management should be maintained for the senior officers.
- 7.7. Any termination payments shall be supported by a clear business case and reported to the Council. Termination payments shall only be authorised by Council.
- 7.8. Before employing interim staff, the Council must consider a full business case.

8. Loans and investments

8.1. All borrowings shall be affected in the name of the Council, after obtaining any necessary borrowing approval. Any application for borrowing approval shall be approved by Council as to terms and purpose. The application for borrowing approval, and subsequent arrangements for the loan shall only be approved by full Council.

- 8.2. Any financial arrangement which does not require formal borrowing approval from the Secretary of State/Welsh Assembly Government (such as Hire Purchase or Leasing of tangible assets) shall be subject to approval by the full Council. In each case a report in writing shall be provided to Council in respect of value for money for the proposed transaction.
- 8.3. The Council will arrange with the Council's banks and investment providers for the sending of a copy of each statement of account to the Chair of the council at the same time as one is issued to the RFO.
- 8.4. All loans and investments shall be negotiated in the name of the Council and shall be for a set period in accordance with Council policy.
- 8.5. The Council shall consider the need for an Investment Strategy and Policy which, if drawn up, shall be in accordance with relevant regulations, proper practices and guidance. Any Strategy and Policy shall be reviewed by the Council at least annually.
- 8.6. All investments of money under the control of the Council shall be in the name of the Council.
- 8.7. All investment certificates and other documents relating thereto shall be retained in the custody of the RFO.
- 8.8. Payments in respect of short term or long-term investments, including transfers between bank accounts held in the same bank, or branch, shall be made in accordance with Regulation 5 (Authorisation of payments) and Regulation 6 (Instructions for payments).

9. Income

- 9.1. The collection of all sums due to the Council shall be the responsibility of and under the supervision of the RFO.
- 9.2. Particulars of all charges to be made for work done, services rendered or goods supplied shall be agreed annually by the Council, notified to the RFO and the RFO shall be responsible for the collection of all accounts due to the Council.
- 9.3. The Council will review all fees and charges at least annually, following a report of the Clerk.
- 9.4. Any sums found to be irrecoverable and any bad debts shall be reported to the Council and shall be written off in the year.
- 9.5. All sums received on behalf of the Council shall be banked intact as directed by the RFO. In all cases, all receipts shall be deposited with the Council's bankers with such frequency as the RFO considers necessary.
- 9.6. The origin of each receipt shall be entered on the paying-in slip.
- 9.7. Personal cheques shall not be cashed out of money held on behalf of the Council.
- 9.8. The RFO shall promptly complete any VAT Return that is required. Any repayment claim due in accordance with VAT Act 1994 section 33 shall be made at least annually coinciding with the financial year end.

- 9.9. Where any significant sums of cash are regularly received by the Council, the RFO shall take such steps as are agreed by the Council to ensure that more than one person is present when the cash is counted in the first instance, that there is a reconciliation to some form of control such as ticket issues, and that appropriate care is taken in the security and safety of individuals banking such cash.
- 9.10. Any income arising which is the property of a charitable trust shall be paid into a charitable bank account. Instructions for the payment of funds due from the charitable trust to the Council (to meet expenditure already incurred by the authority) will be given by the Managing Trustees of the charity meeting separately from any Council meeting (see also Regulation 16 below).

10. Orders for work, goods and services

- 10.1. An official order or letter shall be issued for all work, goods and services unless a formal contract is to be prepared or an official order would be inappropriate. Copies of orders shall be retained.
- 10.2. Order books shall be controlled by the RFO.
- 10.3. All members and officers are responsible for obtaining value for money at all times. An officer issuing an official order shall ensure as far as reasonable and practicable that the best available terms are obtained in respect of each transaction, usually by obtaining three or more quotations or estimates from appropriate suppliers, subject to any de minimis provisions in Regulation 11.1 below.
- 10.4. A member may not issue an official order or make any contract on behalf of the Council.
- 10.5. The RFO shall verify the lawful nature of any proposed purchase before the issue of any order, and in the case of new or infrequent purchases or payments, the RFO shall ensure that the statutory authority shall be reported to the meeting at which the order is approved so that the minutes can record the power being used.

11. Contracts

- 11.1. Procedures as to contracts are laid down as follows:
 - a) Every contract shall comply with these financial regulations, and no exceptions shall be made otherwise than in an emergency provided that this regulation need not apply to contracts which relate to items (i) to (vi) below:
 - i. for the supply of gas, electricity, water, sewerage and telephone services;
 - ii. for specialist services such as are provided by legal professionals acting in disputes;
 - iii. for work to be executed or goods or materials to be supplied which consist of repairs to or parts for existing machinery or equipment or plant;
 - iv. for work to be executed or goods or materials to be supplied which constitute an extension of an existing contract by the council;
 - v. for additional audit work of the external auditor up to an estimated value of £500 (in excess of this sum the Clerk and RFO shall act after consultation with the Chair and Vice Chair of council); and

- vi. for goods or materials proposed to be purchased which are proprietary articles and/or are only sold at a fixed price.
- b) Where the Council intends to procure or award a public supply contract, public service contract or public works contract as defined by The Public Contracts Regulations 2015 ("the Regulations") which is valued at £25,000 or more, the Council shall comply with the relevant requirements of the Regulations².
- c) The full requirements of The Regulations, as applicable, shall be followed in respect of the tendering and award of a public supply contract, public service contract or public works contract which exceed thresholds in The Regulations set by the Public Contracts Directive 2014/24/EU (which may change from time to time)³.
- d) When applications are made to waive financial regulations relating to contracts to enable a price to be negotiated without competition the reason shall be embodied in a recommendation to the Council.
- e) Such invitation to tender shall state the general nature of the intended contract and the Clerk shall obtain the necessary technical assistance to prepare a specification in appropriate cases. The invitation shall in addition state that tenders must be addressed to the Clerk in the ordinary course of post. Each tendering firm shall be supplied with a specifically marked envelope in which the tender is to be sealed and remain sealed until the prescribed date for opening tenders for that contract.
- f) All sealed tenders shall be opened at the same time on the prescribed date by the Clerk in the presence of at least one member of Council.
- g) Any invitation to tender issued under this regulation shall be subject to Standing Orders and shall refer to the terms of the Bribery Act 2010.
- h) When it is to enter into a contract of less than £25,000 in value for the supply of goods or materials or for the execution of works or specialist services other than such goods, materials, works or specialist services as are excepted as set out in paragraph (a) the Clerk or RFO shall obtain 3 quotations (priced descriptions of the proposed supply); where the value is below £3,000 and above £300 the Clerk or RFO shall strive to obtain 3 estimates. Otherwise, Regulation 10.3 above shall apply.
- i) The Council shall not be obliged to accept the lowest or any tender, quote or estimate.
- j) Should it occur that the Council, or duly delegated committee, does not accept any tender, quote or estimate, the work is not allocated and the Council requires further pricing, provided that the specification does not change, no person shall be permitted to submit a later tender, estimate or quote who was present when the original decision-making process was being undertaken.

² The Regulations require councils to use the Contracts Finder website to advertise contract opportunities, set out the procedures to be followed in awarding new contracts and to publicise the award of new contracts

³ Thresholds currently applicable are:

a) For public supply and public service contracts 209,000 Euros (£181,302)

b) For public works contracts 5,225,000 Euros (£4,551,413)

12. Payments under contracts for building or other construction works

- 12.1. Payments on account of the contract sum shall be made within the time specified in the contract by the RFO upon authorised certificates of the architect or other consultants engaged to supervise the contract (subject to any percentage withholding as may be agreed in the particular contract).
- 12.2. Where contracts provide for payment by instalments the RFO shall maintain a record of all such payments. In any case where it is estimated that the total cost of work carried out under a contract, excluding agreed variations, will exceed the contract sum by 5% or more a report shall be submitted to the Council.
- 12.3. Any variation to a contract or addition to or omission from a contract must be approved by the Council and Clerk to the contractor in writing, the Council being informed where the final cost is likely to exceed the financial provision.

13. Stores and equipment

- 13.1. The officer in charge of each section shall be responsible for the care and custody of stores and equipment in that section.
- 13.2. Delivery notes shall be obtained in respect of all goods received into store or otherwise delivered and goods must be checked as to order and quality at the time delivery is made.
- 13.3. Stocks shall be kept at the minimum levels consistent with operational requirements.
- 13.4. The RFO shall be responsible for periodic checks of stocks and stores at least annually.

14. Assets, properties and estates

- 14.1. The Clerk shall make appropriate arrangements for the custody of all title deeds and Land Registry Certificates of properties held by the Council. The RFO shall ensure a record is maintained of all properties held by the Council, recording the location, extent, plan, reference, purchase details, nature of the interest, tenancies granted, rents payable and purpose for which held in accordance with Accounts and Audit Regulations.
- 14.2. No tangible moveable property shall be purchased or otherwise acquired, sold, leased or otherwise disposed of, without the authority of the Council, together with any other consents required by law, save where the estimated value of any one item of tangible movable property does not exceed £250.
- 14.3. No real property (interests in land) shall be sold, leased or otherwise disposed of without the authority of the Council, together with any other consents required by law. In each case a report in writing shall be provided to Council in respect of valuation and surveyed condition of the property (including matters such as planning permissions and covenants) together with a proper business case (including an adequate level of consultation with the electorate).
- 14.4. No real property (interests in land) shall be purchased or acquired without the authority of the full Council. In each case a report in writing shall be provided to Council in respect of valuation and surveyed condition of the property (including matters such as planning permissions and covenants) together with a proper business case (including an adequate level of consultation with the electorate).

- 14.5. Subject only to the limit set in Regulation 14.2 above, no tangible moveable property shall be purchased or acquired without the authority of the full Council. In each case a report in writing shall be provided to Council with a full business case.
- 14.6. The RFO shall ensure that an appropriate and accurate Register of Assets and Investments is kept up to date. The continued existence of tangible assets shown in the Register shall be verified at least annually, possibly in conjunction with a health and safety inspection of assets.

15. Insurance

- 15.1. Following the annual risk assessment (per Regulation 17), the RFO shall effect all insurances and negotiate all claims on the Council's insurers.
- 15.2. The RFO shall keep a record of all insurances effected by the Council and the property and risks covered thereby and annually review it.
- 15.3. The RFO shall be notified of any loss liability or damage or of any event likely to lead to a claim, and shall report these to Council at the next available meeting.
- 15.4. All appropriate members and employees of the Council shall be included in a suitable form of security or fidelity guarantee insurance which shall cover the maximum risk exposure as determined annually by the council, or duly delegated committee.

16. Charities

16.1. Where the Council is sole managing trustee of a charitable body the Clerk and RFO shall ensure that separate accounts are kept of the funds held on charitable trusts and separate financial reports made in such form as shall be appropriate, in accordance with Charity Law and legislation, or as determined by the Charity Commission. The RFO shall arrange for any audit or independent examination as may be required by Charity Law or any Governing Document.

17. Risk management

- 17.1. The Council is responsible for putting in place arrangements for the management of risk. The RFO shall prepare, for approval by the Council, risk management policy statements in respect of all activities of the council. Risk policy statements and consequential risk management arrangements shall be reviewed by the Council at least annually.
- 17.2. When considering any new activity, the RFO shall prepare a draft risk assessment including risk management proposals for consideration and adoption by the council.

18. Suspension and revision of Financial Regulations

- 18.1. It shall be the duty of the Council to review the Financial Regulations of the Council from time to time. The Clerk shall make arrangements to monitor changes in legislation or proper practices and shall advise the Council of any requirement for a consequential amendment to these Financial Regulations.
- 18.2. The Council may, by resolution of the Council duly notified prior to the relevant meeting of Council, suspend any part of these Financial Regulations provided that reasons for the suspension are recorded and

that an assessment of the risks arising has been drawn up and presented in advance to all members of Council.

A resident asked for costings in relation to the provision and relocation of the dog waste bins at Oldends lane playing field. The Chair thanked the resident for the question and explained that she would receive a written reply from the Clerk. The resident also asked about why a project officer was being recruited as her view was that it would only serve to duplicate the work of the town Clerk. It was explained that the project officer would be directly involved in delivering community projects which, whilst the clerk has some input into, would principally be undertaken by the projects post. It was stated that the cost of the post was included in the 2023/24 budget.

By agreement, the Chair stated that the residents wishing to talk on the issue of Verney Fields could make their contributions during the agenda item.

By agreement, the Chair suspended the town council's Standing Orders to discuss an urgent item in relation to Verney Fields

<u>B/Verney Fields</u> To discuss recent developments to Verney Fields and approve relevant and suitable actions

Discussion provided the following concerns: 1. New signs had been erected at all site entrances and different parts of Verney Fields 2. The new owner refers to his business as a 'Farm' - owing to planning laws, farms do not need planning permission

to erect farm related buildings.

The Chair explained that the town council has submitted its application for Verney Fields to receive 'Town Green status' supported by 121 witness statements from local residents/users over a period of decades. The submission has yet to be validated by GCC but this is due very soon. TPO;s are in Place for all trees in site including the two adjacent pieces of Woodland. Also mentioned was the fact that certain residents were seeking DMMO's on all Rights of way over the field. There was a need to discuss with GCC the need to reopen the older, now unusable footpaths/Rights of Way. The option to ask the current owners to retain the walked paths for the public to continue to enjoy; it was however thought that this would only serve to curtail the use of other parts of the land.

It was made clear that the town council had tried on several occasions to engage with the owners of the land but they were not prepared to discuss any issues.

The Clerk highlighted the fact that the town council had received several queries from concerned residents and these were presented at the meeting albeit without personal details.

The following actions were agreed:

- 1. To formulate a press release that highlights the value of the land to the whole of the Stonehouse Community, the town council's application for Town Green status and the forthcoming consultation in support of the application; this to be distributed to the local press, added to social media etc.
- 2. To acknowledge the newly formed 'Friends of the Verney Field' Group and to advertise its existence
- 3. To respond to the enquiries made by residents
- 4. To enquire about some of the statements made on notices by the new land owners, most notably, the need to keep dogs on leads.

The Chair thanked everyone for their input

By agreement, the Chair brought forward agenda item B/508

B/508 To approve a grant application from Sunflowers Suicide Support

A representative of Sunflower Suicide Support was asked to provide an overview of the application. There were a number of questions raised, most notably, how the funding currently held by the organisation was being allocated, whether there had been an increase in the need for the service and a rough idea of the specific needs within the Stonehouse Community.

The representative stated that the current balance was restricted to salaries only - the sessions are an additional cost; there had been a significant increase in the need for the service in the Stroud and Stonehouse areas with 24 new referrals overall, 5 of which are Stonehouse based.

Committee APPROVED the £2,000 grant application.
